Moreland Elementary

Our Title paraprofessionals attend all team meetings and student success meetings with valuable input and data to share about student achievement. We love our Title 1 paras and couldn’t obtain the level of student success without them.

Our ELL students are fortunate to participate in the Imagine Learning Program. Students work at their level using listening, speaking and assessing on the computers. Students are given practice and support in 9 specific areas. Some of those are: Phonological awareness, vocabulary, listening comprehension, reading comprehension, and letter and word recognition. The program is very engaging for students and has proven to be very effective in strengthening language skills.



This is benchmark testing month. We are close to being finished with the IRI and STAR Early Literacy. We will take that data and compare to teacher assessment classroom data, to make adjustments if necessary in student instruction. With this being the first year of STAR Early Literacy testing, we are trying to learn and understand the implications of the testing Data. Sherrilynn Bair has scheduled a visit to an Elementary school in Idaho Falls who is using the STAR Early Literacy test. We are going with some “How”, “What”, “Why” questions to help us learn, understand and use the data to better serve our students and our teaching instruction.
