There are a few parking spots on each end of the parking lot for patrons to use, as well as on the north end of the building. This allows more room for cars to go through the drop-off zone and makes these busy times quicker and safer. We have received a lot of positive feedback from patrons on these newly adapted safety measures.

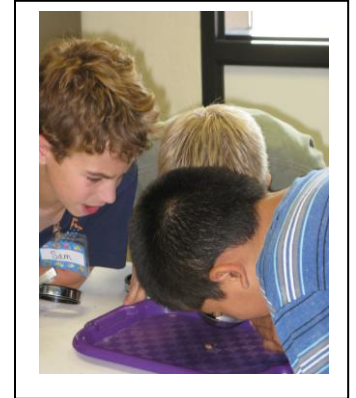


Rockford Elementary
